

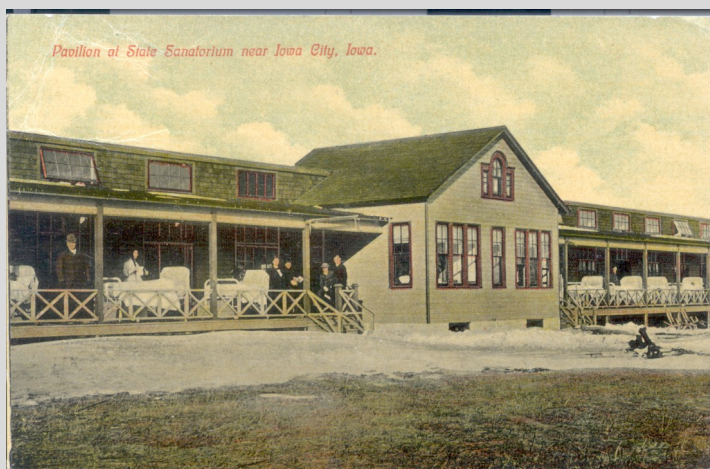

The year was 1906. Iowa appropriated \$50,000 for a State Sanatorium for the treatment of tuberculosis. Kathy Fait will share information about life at Oakdale Sanatorium and the treatments for tuberculosis before the advent of antibiotics. These included a healthy diet, strong in milk and eggs, fresh air which meant freezing in the winter and roasting in the summer, and more invasive methods like collapsing lungs.
