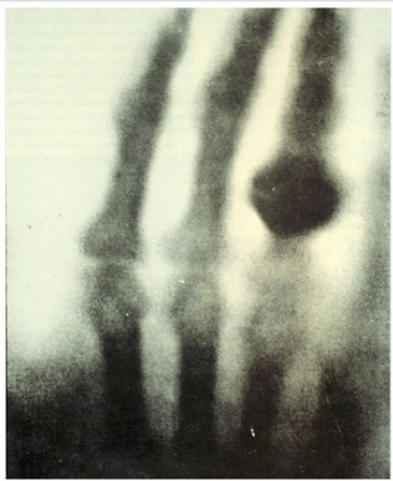

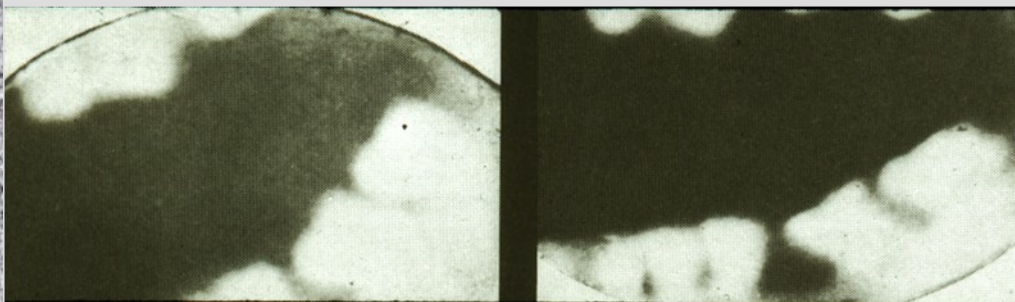

When Professor Roentgen discovered the x ray in Nov. 1895 his last thought was how this would provide job security to the speaker. The first radiology office was Prof. Roentgen's own physics laboratory at the Univ. of Würzburg, Germany. The first "patient" was his wife Bertha, who had a radiograph of her hand made. Although some might say the diagnostic quality left something to be desired, others have said that it was the best hand radiograph made up to that time. Things changed rapidly.

Over the past 115 years there have been major advances in imaging technique. Axel will present the historical advances in radiology from a dental perspective.
